RESOLUTION NO. 183-92

ADOPTING LOCAL LAW NO. 5 FOR 1992  
A LOCAL LAW REAPPORTIONING ST. LAWRENCE COUNTY LEGISLATIVE DISTRICTS

WHEREAS, the County legislature must adjust its legislative representation in light of the results of the 1990 decennial census, pursuant to the United States Constitution and Article 2 §10 of the New York State General Municipal Law; and

WHEREAS, the County Board of Legislators, after considering the alternatives, has determined that a plan of apportionment consisting of twenty-two legislative districts will best serve the interests of the residents of this county; and

WHEREAS, segments of certain existing legislative district boundaries follow local election district boundaries that do not conform to State law, and therefore require adjustment concurrently with any new plan of apportionment, and

WHEREAS, the St. Lawrence County Board of Legislators has held a public hearing on proposed Local Law No. 5 for the Year 1992,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the St. Lawrence County Board of Legislators hereby adopts Local Law No. 5 for the Year 1992.

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Mr. Luckie made a motion to adopt Resolution No. 183-92, seconded by Mr. Teele and Mr. McFaddin.

Mr. Lacy made a motion to amend Local Law No. 5 for the Year 1992, as per the amendments on your desks, a substitute resolution, seconded by Mr. Romigh.

Chairman Bradley asked the County Attorney if this required Suspension of the Rules and Mr. Lekki replied no.

Mr. Lacy said in teaching his students government, he has found one sentence that applies: "Democracy is a type of Government in which the people decide how they will be ruled". Mr. Lacy also requested his statement be in the minutes and it is attached. (See Page 277) After considerable discussion, Mr. Snider called the question to close debate on the amendment, which was seconded. By a roll call vote on calling the question, it was carried with fourteen (14) yes votes and eight (8) no votes (Teele, D. Smith, Carey, J. Smith, Lacy, Bradley, Luckie, and Romigh).

By a roll call vote on the amendment, the amendment failed with six (6) yes votes (J. Smith, Lacy, Pierce, Luckie, Wells, Romigh), and sixteen (16) no votes.

There was further discussion on the original resolution and Local Law, and whether the question could be on the ballot in November 1992. Mr. Lekki and Mr. Rische reported that September 22nd is the last time that you can adopt anything, and the only possibility is that if you enact something tonight and have a Special Board meeting on September 21, 1992.

Mr. Snider said if the majority of this Board decides if they want another option, that is fine, but Mr. Snider moved this original resolution forward, seconded by Mr. Morrill, and carried by a voice vote with twenty (20) yes votes and two (2) no votes (Morse and Luckie).

By a roll call vote on Resolution No. 183-92, Adopting Local Law No. 5 as originally presented, the vote was eighteen (18) yes votes and four (4) no votes (Moore, Luckie, Wells, and Romigh).

Chairman Bradley said if you wish to do anything else, there has to be another resolution typed and on your desks before it is adopted.

#### LOCAL LAW NO. 5 FOR THE YEAR 1992

##### REAPPORTIONING ST. LAWRENCE COUNTY LEGISLATIVE DISTRICTS

**BE IT ENACTED** by the Board of Legislators of the County of St. Lawrence as follows:

##### Section 1: LEGISLATIVE INTENT

This Local Law is intended to fulfill the requirements of the United States Constitution that there be equal representation of the population and to meet requirements set forth in State law. The St. Lawrence County Board of Legislators has chosen to do this by redrawing the County's twenty-two Legislative Districts' boundaries to achieve fair and equitable representation in light of the 1990 Census of Population.

Section 3: MODIFICATIONS TO LEGISLATIVE DISTRICT BOUNDARIES.

Certain Legislative District boundaries involve local election district boundaries which heretofore did not conform to state law in all respects or which are different in other respects than previously. Details of the legislative district boundaries are as follow:

- A. Boundary Between Legislative Districts No. 5 and No. 6:  
District 5 (Canton Election Districts 1, 3 and 6);  
District 6 (Canton Election Districts 2, 4, 7, 8 and 9).

The boundary between Legislative Districts No. 5 and No. 6 is modified to conform to the modified boundary between Canton Eds #1 and #8 as it follows the newly extended Village boundary to the east and northeast,

encompassing annexed lands south of SR 11 and rejoining the existing district boundary along the centerline of the state highway.

The Legislative District boundary is further modified to conform to the modified boundary between Canton EDs #3 and #8 as it follows the newly extended Village boundary to the east and northeast, encompassing two areas of annexed land between the CONRAIL right-of-way and the center line of SR 11.

The Legislative District boundary is further modified to conform to the modified boundary between Canton EDs #6 and #7 as it follows the newly extended Village boundary to the southwest in a roughly triangular area between the centerline of SR 11 and the former Village boundary on the northeast side of the Grass River, and further modified to follow the modified boundary between Canton EDs #6 and #7 along the centerline of the Grass River near the campus of Canton Technical College.

B. Boundary between Legislative Districts No. 9 and No. 10:

District 9 (Hammond, Gouverneur Election District #5, Morristown, Rossie);  
District 10 (DeKalb, DePeyster, Gouverneur Election District #6, Macomb.

The boundary between Legislative Districts No. 9 and No. 10 is modified to conform to the modified boundary between Gouverneur EDs #5 and #6 as it follows the centerlines of the Little Bow Road, Oswegatchie River and Peabody Road from the Town boundary to the Village boundary on the north and south.

C. Boundaries of Legislative Districts No. 7, No. 13, No. 14 and No. 15:

District No. 7 (Clare, Pierrepont, Potsdam ED #1, Russell)  
District No. 13 (Potsdam Election Districts 2, 5 and 11)  
District No. 14 (Potsdam Election Districts 6, 7 and 10)  
District No. 15 (Potsdam Election Districts 3, 4, 8, 9, 12).

The boundary between Legislative Districts No. 7 and No. 13 is modified to conform to the modified boundary between Potsdam ED #1 and #11 as it includes recently annexed land south of State Route 11 west of Clarkson University. The boundary is further modified to follow the modified boundary between ED #1 and ED #5 as it follows a minor tributary of the Raquette River west of the Sugar Island Dam penstock and tailrace channel.

The boundary between Legislative Districts No. 13 and No. 14 is modified to conform to the modified boundary between Potsdam EDs #6 and #11 starting at the Maple St. bridge as it follows the center lines of Main St., Pierrepont Avenue and Poplar St. and crosses to the middle of a side channel of the Raquette River to a point on the current district boundary.

The boundary between Legislative Districts No. 13 and No. 14 is further modified to conform to the modified boundary between Potsdam EDs #10 and #11 as it follows the center lines of a channel generally along the eastern bank of the Raquette River from Maple St. to the northern Village boundary.

The boundary between Legislative Districts No. 13 and No. 15 is modified to conform to the modified boundary between Potsdam EDs #2 and #3 as it follows the center line of SR 345 (Madrid-Potsdam Road) from the northern town boundary to the Village of Potsdam.

The boundary between Legislative Districts No. 13 and No. 15 is further modified to conform to the modified boundary between Potsdam EDs #4 and #5 starting at the Village boundary as it follows the centerlines of May Road, Regan Road and State Route 11 to the Town boundary.

The boundary between Legislative Districts No. 14 and No. 15 conforms to the modified boundary between Potsdam EDs #7 and #9 as it follows the centerline of Elm St. from Market St. to Lawrence Avenue and the modified EDs #7 and #8 boundary as it follows the centerline of Lawrence Avenue to the Village boundary.

The boundary between Legislative Districts No. 14 and No. 15 is further modified to conform to the modified Village boundary as it encompasses newly annexed land west of outer Market St. on the modified Potsdam EDs #4 and #10 boundary.

- D. Boundaries of Legislative Districts No. 17, No. 18 and No. 19:  
District No. 17 (Oswegatchie, Ogdensburg Election District 2)  
District No. 18 (Ogdensburg Election Districts 1, 4 and 5)  
District No. 19 (Ogdensburg Election Districts 3, 6 and 7)

The boundaries of City Election Districts #1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6 are modified fundamentally and Election District #7 is somewhat modified. Each Legislative District boundary is described individually in terms of the new local election district boundaries.

The boundary of Legislative District No. 17 shall consist of the entire area of the Town of Oswegatchie and the modified boundary of Ogdensburg Election District #2. The modified boundary of ED #2, starting at the City boundary, follows the centerlines of Pickering Street and Jersey Avenue, crosses to the middle of the Oswegatchie River on a visual extension of Jersey Avenue, follows mid-channel downstream and then a visual extension of Grove St., and then follows the centerlines of Grove, Albany, Oak, and Jefferson, and a visual extension of Jefferson to the City boundary, and returns from there to Pickering St.

The boundary of Legislative District No. 18 shall be inclusive of the modified boundaries of City Election Districts # 1, 4 and 5. Beginning at the City boundary at the end of a visual extension of Jefferson St., the boundary of Election District #1 follows the City boundary southwest, then northwest to the international boundary in the St. Lawrence River, then generally northeast along the international boundary to a point off the mouth of the Oswegatchie River, then southeast to and following the mid-channel of that river to the meeting point of the boundaries of Election Districts #1 and #4. The legislative district boundary then follows the turns of the modified boundary of ED #4 along a visual extension of Montgomery St., the centerline of Montgomery St., Franklin St., Jay St., Patterson St., Knox St., Park St., Jay St., Plover Hill Avenue, Lafayette St. and Park St. to the City boundary. The boundary then follows the City boundary and the Election District #2 boundary and mid-channel of the Oswegatchie River to the beginning.

The boundary of Legislative District No. 19 is inclusive of Election District #3, 6 and 7. The modified boundary of Election District #3 in part follows the modified boundaries of Election Districts #1 and #4. The Election District #6 boundary in part follows the modified boundaries of Election Districts #4 and 5. The Election District #7 boundary in part follows the modified boundaries of Election District #5. (See descriptions for Legislative Districts No. 17 and No. 18.

E. Boundaries of Legislative Districts No. 20, No. 21 and No. 22:

District No. 20 (Massena Election Districts 10, 11 and 12, 14)

District No. 21 (Massena Election Districts 1, 2, 7, 8 and 9)

District No. 22 (Massena Election Districts 3, 4, 5, 6, 13)

The boundary between Legislative Districts No. 20 and No. 21 is modified to conform to the modified boundaries of Massena EDs #8, 10, 11 and 12 starting at Orchard St. along the center line of North Main St., Stoughton St., Beach St., Park St., Center St., and North Main St. to the middle of the Main St. bridge.

The boundary between Legislative Districts No. 20 and 22 is modified to conform to the modified boundaries of Massena EDs #12, 14, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 13. Starting at the middle of the Main St. bridge, the boundary follows the mid-channel of the Grass River to the Village boundary, then along the Village boundary to East Hatfield St., then along Outer East Hatfield St. to a visual extension of the O'Neil Road, along the visual extension to mid-channel of the Raquette River, and then following the mid-channel line to the Town boundary.

The boundary between Legislative Districts No. 21 and 22 is modified to conform to the modified boundaries of Massena EDs #1, 7, 3, 5, and 6 starting in the middle of the Main St. bridge and following the centerlines of South Main St., West Orvis St., Danforth St., Bridges St., South Main St., east along the State Arterial (SR 37), south along the center line of the railroad right-of-way to mid-channel of the Raquette

River, then downstream in mid-channel to a point opposite a visual extension of Urban Drive, and then at a right angle from mid-channel to the southern Village boundary near a private loop road.

**Section 4: SEPARABILITY OF PROVISIONS**

If any clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section or part of this Local Law shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such judgment, decree or order shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation of the clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, section, or part thereof directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment, decree or order shall have been rendered.

**Section 5: CONFLICT WITH PREVIOUS LOCAL LAWS**

In the event of a conflict or inconsistency between this Local Law and any previous Local Law or Resolution of this Board of Legislators, this Local Law shall govern.

**Section 6: EFFECTIVE DATE**

This Local Law shall take effect when all applicable statutory requirements for its passage, adoption and implementation have been complied with fully and it has been duly filed as provided by the Municipal Home Rule Law.

RESOLUTION NO. 184-92

ADOPTING LOCAL LAW NO. 6 1992
