WHEREAS, funding for the FY2022 Emergency Management Performance Grant (EMPG) is provided by the US Department of Homeland Security Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and is administered by the NYS Division of Homeland Security, and

WHEREAS, an annual grant in the amount of \$47,211 has been awarded to the Office of Emergency Services (X2043055 57000) with a contract period of October 1, 2021 through September 30, 2024, and

AUTHORIZING THE CONTINUATION OF AGRICULTURAL DISTRICT 2 AND ACCEPTING MODIFICATIONS TO THE DISTRICT

WHEREAS, St. Lawrence County has established an agricultural districts program to protect and enhance its agricultural resources, and

WHEREAS, Section 303-a of the New York State Agriculture and Markets Law requires agricultural districts be reviewed every eight (8) years to authorize the continuation, with or without modifications to the district, and

WHEREAS, Section 303-b of the same law authorizes annual reviews to receive requests from property owners to add land to an agricultural district, and

WHEREAS, from March 1st to March 30th, the County received no requests to add land to Agricultural District 1, and received requests from two (2) property owners to add 80.7 acres and remove 3.6 acres from Agricultural District 2, and

WHEREAS, the Agricultural and Farmland Protection Board recommends accepting all modifications as requested by each property owner, and

WHEREAS, based on agricultural exemptions, real property classifications, and satellite imagery, the Agricultural and Farmland Protection Board recommends adding 397 parcels totaling 31,438.1 acres of viable agricultural lands to Agricultural District 2, and removing 126 parcels of non-agricultural uses totaling 1,167.8 acres from the same district,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the Board of Legislators authorizes the continuation of Agricultural District 2 and accepts modifications to the District, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Planning Office will submit the eight year review report and appropriate documentation to the Commissioner of Agriculture and Markets for certification as required by law.

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AUTHORIZING THE CHAIR TO SIGN AN AMENDMENT TO THE CONTRACT WITH HEALTH RESEARCH INC. (HRI) FOR EPIDEMIOLOGY AND LABORATORY CAPACITY (ELC) REOPENING SCHOOLS

WHEREAS, Health Research Inc./New York State Department of Health (HRI/NYSDOH) awarded funding to local health departments (LHDs), and

WHEREAS, Resolution No. 211-2021 approved a contract for Epidemiology and Laboratory Capacity (ELC) Reopening Schools and the Public Health Department was awarded \$3,407,799 (PPZ44895 57000 SCH) with objectives and goals to focus primarily on providing needed resources to implement COVID-19 screening testing programs in public and private schools aligned with the CDC recommendations for K-12 to support and maintain in-person learning, and

WHEREAS, this funding may also be used for coordination, management, technical assistance, monitoring, data collection, and reporting activities to support K-12 screening testing programs, and

WHEREAS, to date, \$762,563 has been spent to support test kits, supplies, and screening testing activities in K-12 schools within the County,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Legislators authorizes the Chair to sign an amendment to the contract with Health Research Inc./New York State Department of Health (HRI/NYSDOH) for Epidemiology and Laboratory Capacity (ELC) Reopening Schools, upon approval of the County Attorney, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the original agreement period was July 1, 2021 through July 31, 2022, and this amendment would extend the contract through July 31, 2023.

AUTHORIZING AN INTERGOVERNMENTAL TRANSFER FOR AN UPPER PAYMENT LIMIT AND MODIFYING THE 2022 BUDGET FOR COMMUNITY SERVICES

WHEREAS, the Federal Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services has approved a 2020 Clinic Upper Payment Limit (UPL) that authorizes supplemental payments for freestanding county-operated behavioral health clinics for the State Fiscal Year 2020-21, and

WHEREAS, the UPL is a supplemental payment that pays the difference between the Medicaid fee-for-service payment and what Medicare would have paid facilities for the same services, and

WHEREAS, St. Lawrence County is responsible for contributing an Intergovernmental Transfer (IGT) of the non-federal share of the clinic UPL payment to the State in the amount of \$55,852, due by June 15, 2022, and

WHEREAS, St. Lawrence County freestanding clinics, licensed under Article 31 and 32 of the NYS Mental Hygiene Law, are scheduled to receive a payment totaling \$111,703 for the period of April 1, 2020, through March 31, 2021,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Legislators authorizes an Intergovernmental Transfer for an Upper Payment Limit, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Treasurer is authorized to modify the 2022 Budget for Community Services, as follows:

AUTHORIZING THE CHAIR TO SIGN AN AGREEMENT WITH DRUGSCAN FOR USE OF A CENTRIFUGE DEVICE FOR COMMUNITY SERVICES

WHEREAS, on March 18, 2013, Resolution No. 72-2013 was passed authorizing a contract agreement with ACM Medical Laboratory, now known as Drugscan, to provide laboratory services, and

WHEREAS, Community Services is required to provide mental health and chemical dependency lab services to individuals with mental illness and/or substance and alcohol abuse problems, and

WHEREAS, the Department will be synchronizing electronic health record with Drugscan allowing for collection of specimens, including blood-drawls, in-house and direct picked-up at the clinic for analysis, and

WHEREAS, a centrifuge is a necessary piece of equipment in this process, and Drugscan has agreed to provide Community Services with a Centrifuge to processing the lab samples, at no charge,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Legislators authorizes the Chair to sign an agreement with Drugscan for use of a Centrifuge device for Community Services, upon approval of the County Attorney, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that all necessary policies and onsite training will take place by September to ensure proper use and maintenance of the equipment.

OPPOSING THE RECENTLY ENACTED "NEW YORK STATE GUN PACKAGE"
CONSISTING OF TEN (10) BILLS IDENTIFIED AS A.1023-A/S.4970-A, A.6716-A/S89-B, A.7926-A/S.4116-A, A.7865-A/S.4511-A, A.10428-A/S.9229-A, A.10497/S.9407-B, A.10501/S.9465, A.10502/S.9113-A, A.10503/S.9458, AND A.10504/S.9456 AND CALLING UPON THE STATE OF NEW YORK TO ADEQUATELY ADDRESS THE FUNDAMENTAL CAUSES OF MASS SHOOTINGS

WHEREAS, on June 6th, 2022, New York State Governor Kathy Hochul signed into law "The New York State Gun Package," a group of ten (10) legislative acts designed to impede, prohibit, or ban the acquisition of certain firearms, ban the possession of certain equipment utilized in defense of firearm utilization, and the imposition of strict measures upon officials across the State of New York to report certain activities related to the acquisition, sale, and/or possession of a firearm, and

WHEREAS, Raising the Age to Purchase Semiautomatic Rifles (Legislation S.9458/A.10503), Banning Body Armor (Legislation S.9407-B/A.10497), Strengthening the Red Flag Laws currently in existence (Legislation S.9113-A/A.10502), Microstamping (Legislation S.4116-A/A.7926), Expanding the definition of the term "firearm" (Legislation S.9456/A.10504), eliminating the grandfathering of large capacity ammunition feeding devices lawfully possessed since before the enactment of the SAFE Act (Legislation A.10428-A/S.9229-A), and other similar bills enacted with the expectation they will go into effect in thirty (30) or ninety (90) days depending on the bill, and

WHEREAS, the stated purpose of these bills was to deter future heinous mass shootings such as that perpetrated by a lone gunman in Buffalo, New York, and

WHEREAS, Legislation S.9113-A/A.10502, previously referenced as having enhanced the existing "Red Flag" Laws, expands who may file an Extreme Risk Protection Order (ERPO) and requires police and district attorneys to file ERPO petitions when they have acquired credible information that an individual is likely to engage in conduct that would result in serious harm either to themselves or others, and

WHEREAS, the imposition of the mandate to perform civil ERPO proceedings on county officers, such as the district attorney, was done without the consultation or consent of the various counties around the State of New York and is duplicative of the Mental Hygiene Law Article 81 procedures already in place, and

WHEREAS, the imposition of an ERPO will permit law enforcement, under order of the Court, to seize every weapon in the home of an individual subject to the ERPO, including weapons owned by individuals who may not be a party to the legal action, and

- WHEREAS, Legislation A.10428-A/S.9229-A, which eliminates the grandfathering of large capacity ammunition feeding devices lawfully possessed since before the enactment of the SAFE Act, will now make it illegal for individuals who have lawfully possessed large ammunition feeding devices, or clips, to continue to possess those devices; however, a Second Circuit Court of Appeals Decision from October of 2015 suggests that limitations on large capacity feeding devices may be unconstitutional, and
- **WHEREAS**, the actions of the State of New York have arguably created ex post facto laws, and
- WHEREAS, ex post facto laws, or laws that criminalize conduct that was previously legal are prohibited under the United States Constitution Article 1, Section 9, which states, "No state shall enter into any treaty, alliance, or confederation; grant letters of marque and reprisal; coin money; emit bills of credit; make anything but gold and silver coin a tender in payment of debts; pass any bill of attainder, ex post facto law, or law impairing the obligation of contracts, or grant any title of nobility," and
- WHEREAS, Raising the Age to Purchase Semiautomatic Rifles (Legislation S.9458/A.10503) and Banning Body Armor (Legislation S.9407-B/A.10497) seeks to impede the sale and possession of items in the stream of commerce between the various states, and
- WHEREAS, the Commerce Clause, which refers to Article 1, Section 8, Clause 3, of the U.S. Constitution, gives Congress the power "to regulate commerce with foreign nations, and among the several states, and with the Indian tribes", and
- WHEREAS, implicit in the Commerce Clause is the limitation on states passing legislation that discriminates against or excessively burdens interstate commerce, and
- WHEREAS, if these bills survive scrutiny under the ex post facto clause and/or the Commerce Clause, many of the bills are likely infirm due to their infringement upon the Second Amendment of the United States Constitution, and
- WHEREAS, the Second Amendment to the United States Constitution, adopted in 1791 as part of the Bill of Rights, protects the inalienable and individual right of the people to keep and bear arms, and
- WHEREAS, the Supreme Court rule in *District of Columbia v. Heller*, 554 U.S. 570 (2008), "[t]he Second Amendment...is the very product of an interest balancing by the people...(which) surely elevates above all other interests the rights of law-abiding, responsible citizens to use arms in defense of hearth and home", and
- WHEREAS, the Supreme Court ruled in *McDonald v. Chicago*, 561 U.S. 742 (2010), that the right of an individual to "keep and bear arms," as protected under the Second Amendment, is incorporated by the Due Process Clause of the Fourteenth Amendment against the "infringement by the States", and
- WHEREAS, since 2015, the Board of Legislators has passed a local law and several resolutions supporting the fundamental and individual right to bear arms under the Second Amendment of the United States Constitution, and

WHEREAS, in addition to the local law challenging the definition of the term "proper cause," as found within Penal Law § 400.00, and the numerous resolutions passed opposing gun restriction by the State of New York, the St. Lawrence County Board of Legislators has authorized the adoption of the Amicus arguments supporting the Second Amendment as presented by 17 similarly situated states in both NYSRPA v. NYC et al. and NYSRPA v. Bruen et al., with a decision currently pending before the United States Supreme Court on the latter, and

WHEREAS, the Board of Legislators appreciates the deep concern held across the nation with respect to the scourge of mass shootings; however, the quick reaction of the State of New York in passing additional gun restrictions that are subject to significant constitutional constraint appears to be no more than agenda-driven, shortsighted politics, and

WHEREAS, New York State is viewed as being one of the most restrictive states within the United States when it comes to the licensure and possession of a firearm, with hundreds of legal provisions related to the possession, sale, use, and distribution of firearms contained within New York State statutes, and

WHEREAS, despite this fact, none of the previous laws enacted by the State of New York to restricting gun possession and usage acted as a restraint on the individual who senselessly attacked others in Buffalo, New York,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED the Board of Legislators opposes the enactment of bills A.1023-A (Paulin)/S.4970-A (Kavanagh), A.6716-A (Wallace)/S89-B (Kaminsky), A.7926-A (Rosenthal, L)/S.4116-A (Hoylman), A7865-A (Fahy)/S.4511-A (Kaplan), A.10428-A (People-Stokes)/S.9229-A (Hoylman), A.10497 (Jacobson)/S.9407-B (Kavanagh), A.10501 (Meeks)/S.9465 (Bailey), A.10502 (Cahill)/S. 9113-A (Skoufis), A.10503 (Jackson)/S.9458 (Thomas), and A.10504 (Burgos)/S.9456 (Sepulveda), better known as "The Gun Package", and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED the Board of Legislators commits to continuing to actively engage in legal resistance to proposed legislation designed to infringe upon the Constitutional and statutory rights granted to United States citizens and New York State citizens, protecting the rights of all lawful gun owners within the State, not just in St. Lawrence County, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board of Legislators calls upon the State of New York to enact meaningful reform to tackle the fundamental causes of mass shootings without infringing upon the rights of innocent New Yorkers, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this resolution be forwarded to Governor Katherine Hochul, Senator Joseph Griffo, Senator Patricia Ritchie, Senator Dan Stec, Assemblyman Ken Blankenbush, Assemblyman Billy Jones, Assemblyman Robert Smullen, and Assemblyman Mark Walczyk.

WHEREAS, the Board of Legislators would like to continue to participate in the workforce training programs implemented through the 2014 Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act, and

WHEREAS, Resolution No. 133-2015 approved the Workforce Investment Operations Agreement and participation has been structured through the Agreement between St. Lawrence County and the St. Lawrence County Workforce Development Board ("WDB"), and

WHEREAS, Resolution No. 268-2019 authorized the Chair to sign an amendment to the contract with the St. Lawrence County Workforce Development Board, agreeing that Barb Lashua will contract with the WDB to serve as its Executive Director, and

WHEREAS, the County is a designated recipient of funds under the Program and is designated as a "local sponsor" for receipt of a New York State Snowmobile Grant funds, and

WHEREAS, the Program establishes a mechanism for allocating funds to local governmental sponsors that engage in the development and maintenance of snowmobile trails designated as part of the State Snowmobile Trail System, and

WHEREAS, the St. Lawrence County Soil and Water Conservation District Manager acts as the Authorized Project Administrator (Administrator) to oversee the operations and deliverables on behalf of the County, and

WHEREAS, several snowmobile associations assist the County in maintaining the trail system and may be designated as Trail Maintenance Entities (hereinafter referred to as the "TME") on behalf of the County, and

WHEREAS, in order to establish the parameters of performance and create a clear understanding of the parties obligations, a contract between the County and each designated TME is appropriate,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED the Board of Legislators authorizes the Chair to sign contracts with designated Trail Maintenance Entities associated with the New York State Snowmobile Trail Grant Program, upon the approval of the County Attorney.

AUTHORIZING THE CHAIR TO SIGN A CONTRACT WITH ST. LAWRENCE HEALTH INITIATIVE FOR THE NEW YORK STATE PUBLIC HEALTH CORPS (NYSPHC) FELLOWSHIP PROGRAM

WHEREAS, Health Research Inc./New York State Department of Health (HRI/NYSDOH), through a Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) sponsored cooperative agreement for Epidemiology and Laboratory Capacity for Infectious Diseases (ELC) has awarded funding to local health departments (LHDs) for the New York State Public Health Corps (NYSPHC) Fellowship Program, and

WHEREAS, the NYSDOH will work with local health departments (LHDs) and community partners to recruit and deploy NYSPHC fellows across the state (excluding New York City), who will commit to a full-time, paid position and a one-year term, and

WHEREAS, this program will help build public health capacity to support COVID-19 response operations and increase preparedness for future public health emergencies, and provide support for coordination and maintenance of the program, and

WHEREAS, this grant has an end date of July 31, 2023, and Public Health will place two (2) fellows with the St. Lawrence Health Initiative, and

WHEREAS, Public Health will provide the program oversight, technology equipment, and supplies needed from grant funding,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Legislators authorizes the Chair to sign a contract with St. Lawrence Health Initiative for the New York State Public Health Corps (NYSPHC) Fellowship Program, upon approval of the County Attorney.

MODIFYING THE 2022 BUDGET FOR THE COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR'S OFFICE FOR COSTS ASSOCIATED WITH COURT-ORDERED TREATMENT SERVICES AT NEW YORK STATE OPERATED INPATIENT MENTAL HYGIENE FACILITIES

WHEREAS, New York Mental Hygiene Law, Section 43.03 (c) mandates a county cost for persons receiving services, pursuant to a court order, at a state-operated inpatient facility for indefinite/extended periods of time, and

WHEREAS, counties are mandated to incur the cost of court ordered charge backs which are haphazard, disproportionate, and cannot be accurately budgeted, forecasted or planned for, and

WHEREAS, in 2020 an administrative change was made by New York State to the payment structure for these costs which shifted a former shared expense between the State and the County to a one-hundred percent (100%) county cost, and

WHEREAS, since the change (2020-2021), St. Lawrence County has spent \$2,205,785 on the care and treatment of individuals being held pursuant to order of a criminal court, and

WHEREAS, invoices for 2022 through April have totaled approximately \$854,979, with the anticipation of receiving bills each month after that through December 2022,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Legislators authorizes the Treasurer to modify the 2022 Budget for the County Administrator's Office for costs associated with court-ordered treatment services at New York State operated inpatient mental hygiene facilities, as follows:

WHEREAS, Resolution No. 369-2019 and Resolution No. 253-2020 authorized the continuance of the current vacancy review process with a recommendation that the vacancies continue to be deliberated at each jurisdictional committee, but one resolution be created for all approved positions to be considered at the Regular Board Meeting,

COMMEMORATING THE 120TH ANNIVERSARY OF ALCOA

WHEREAS, on June 26, 1902, Charles Martin Hall, the inventor of the original aluminum process, committed to purchasing power from a newly built powerhouse on a canal connecting the St. Lawrence and Grasse rivers in St. Lawrence County, and

WHEREAS, the Pittsburgh Reduction Company, which later became known as Alcoa, broke ground for the new plant on July 12, 1902, in Massena, New York, and

WHEREAS, the Alcoa plant in Massena, now recognized as the oldest continuously operating aluminum production and fabricating facility in the western hemisphere, continues to have a significant impact on families and the surrounding communities with generations of families having worked at the plant, and

WHEREAS, according to a recent economic impact study, Alcoa currently employees 450 workers at the Massena plant and continues to contribute to the economic benefits of its employees and the vitality of nearby communities and other businesses throughout St. Lawrence County, and

WHEREAS, since its founding day, Alcoa has grown to become the largest aluminum producer in the world which today operates approximately 350 facilities in 34 countries around the world, and

WHEREAS, Alcoa was the first aluminum company to harness sustainable hydropower to drive the smelting process helping to drive down the price of aluminum, and today hydropower is still a critical part of the strategy of Alcoa to maximize its sources of sustainable, clean, renewable energy, and

WHEREAS, the historic flight of the Wright Brothers took off with an Alcoa aluminum crankcase; its lightness helped tip the balance of power and weight that changed the world of transportation forever and since that day Alcoa has played a key role in nearly every major innovation in aerospace aluminum, and there have been a number of milestones for the Massena plant including the development of a casting method that created larger and higher quality ingots used in a variety of alloys including those used for aircrafts producing aluminum for World War II fighter planes; Titan II rockets; Saturn space vehicles; and Vietnam War helicopters, and

WHEREAS, in 1969, Apollo 8 was constructed with a welding electrode from the Massena Operations, and the Apollo 11 lunar module contained Massena aluminum, and

WHEREAS, Alcoa aluminum helped to build the Empire State Building in 1931, the World Trade Center in 1973, and many other architectural landmarks, not to mention pioneering the technology for rapid production of aluminum cans in 1968; and aluminum wheels in 1948, and

WHEREAS, the success of the Massena plant is in direct correlation to the efforts of its hardworking and dedicated workforce, past and present, and to the supportive involvement and decades of commitment by the surrounding communities given to the organization and those it serves, and

WHEREAS, it is with great pleasure that this Legislative Body acknowledges the many contributions of Alcoa to the local and worldwide economies, and extends its highest regards to this corporate enterprise fully confident that it will continue to thrive and enjoy many more successful years,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Legislators commemorates the 120th anniversary of Alcoa, and

REAPPOINTING THE CONFLICT DEFENDER FOR ST. LAWRENCE COUNTY

WHEREAS, the Conflict Defender has been an attorney with the Office of the Conflict Defender since its inception and assumed leadership of the Department in 2010 after serving as Interim Director to continue the efforts to provide effective representation to individuals who are provided with indigent defense, and

WHEREAS, Resolution No. 249-2010 authorized the initial appointment of the Conflict Defender on July 12, 2010 retroactive to 2009, and

WHEREAS, Resolution No. 183-2014 reappointed Conflict Defender to a second four-year term and Resolution No. 55-2019 appointed the Conflict Defender Amy Dona to a third four-year term to expire July 11, 2022, and

WHEREAS, following a performance appraisal it is the recommendation of the County Administrator that the current Conflict Defender be reappointed to a fourth term,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Legislators reappoints Amy Dona as the Conflict Defender for St. Lawrence County to a four-year term beginning July 12, 2022 through July 11, 2026 at a salary of \$107,846 (Grade VI, Max).
