The St. Lawrence County Youth Bureau is all about empowering teens and making them aware of issues in their community. I spoke with Matthew Denner, Director of Emergency Services / Fire Coordinator in St. Lawrence County.

"Only 11 states in the U.S. consider EMS services essential and a required service. We do not have any hospitals in the county that provide ambulance services. That leaves it up to the local communities to figure it out. By saying it's considered non-essential service, that means the federal government does not recognize EMS as an essential service, and it does not receive federal funding," stated Denner.

Why isn't EMS recognized, alongside fire and police, as an essential service?

When the first structured EMS was established, the support was strong at both the state and federal level. However, federal support was withdrawn leaving funding to the state and local government.

"Small volunteer agencies are running on slim budgets. Most are pretty much exclusively run by unpaid, older volunteers. With slim budgets, it makes it hard to get proper equipment or training. When these things are lacking, it makes performing a job difficult when it should be very efficient. It would be great to recruit more volunteers especially younger ones. It's almost impossible to attract, or retain, younger people to volunteer service because there's no career path for them. This, along with slim budgets, can put a lot of pressure on EMT services," explained Denner.

What can teens do to help out?

Go to an open house at your local fire department and/or EMS service. and look at becoming a member. Many departments have a junior program within their department. There are many opportunities to enroll and begin your rewarding journey as a volunteer firefighter or EMT. This community service is a resume-builder for colleges and jobs. Volunteers can also earn scholarships and take advantage of tuition reimbursement, all while adding experiential knowledge and making lifelong connections that have invaluable influence on character and career.

LCBTQ Pride Month is the positive stance against discrimination and violence toward lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and queer

The month is dedicated to promoting self-affirmation, dignity and equality rights, as well a aims to increase the LGBTQ visibility as a social group while celebrating sexual diversity and gender

Pride, as opposed to shame and social stigma, is the outlook that bolsters most LGBTG rights groups and movements around the world.

Pride has lent its name to LGBTQ-themed events, organizations, institutes, book titles, foundations, a cable TV station, and the Pride Library. Early on the morning of Saturday, June 28, 1969, police raided a gay bar in New York City, known as the Stonewall Inn.

The event brought on a series of riots by LGBTQ persons, constituting as the most important event leading to the the gay liberation movement and the modern fight for LGBTQ rights in the US.

The month of June was chosen to honor and commemorate those Stonewall riots.

Brenda Howard is known as the "Mother of Pride", for her work in coordinating the first LGBTQ Pride march to commemorate the first anniversary of the Stonewall riots.

Howard also originated the idea for a week-long series of events around Pride Day which became the genesis of the annual LGBTQ Pride festive celebrations that are now held around the world every June.

LGBTQ Pride Month events draw millions of participants from around the world each year

Today, the month-long celebrations include pride parades, marches, parties, concerts/shows, workshops, symposiums and rallies across the entire pation.



MORRISTOWN —

With a congratulatory introduction of their literary publication, parents and staff gathered in the second grade classroom at Morristown Central School to meet the young authors. The class, under the direction of their teacher, TinaMarie Hawes, recently published a collaborative book — "Two Little Lost Squirrels." School principal Mr. David Doe, to whom the book is dedicated, was surprised as well as a little emotional after receiving a copy of the publication. Mrs. Hawes had approached Ms. Vaughn, Superintendent and Mr. Doe, Principal early in the school year regarding information on publishing a classroom book from Students Treasures. "I had worked with this company in the past and have always had excellent results. I feel the experience of having a published work encourages our students to write," said the second grade teacher. "I worked the writing process into my writing curriculum. We began the process in September and after several weeks of practice, we were ready to start writing. There were a lot of sentence building and revisions. In the end, we beat our deadline and we had the materials submitted." As a class, the students made all the decisions concerning the book. Including the title, character names, character development and setting. The story was collaborative, each student building on what the student before them had wrote. "The class, as a whole, determined the plot, conflict and resolution," said Mrs. Hawes. "This was a very lengthy process for a group of second graders. Everyone gave suggestions and were encouraged to add to the story. The students wrote as much as they were comfortable with." We had just finished our habitats unit and had been discussing the possibility of getting a class pet. "As their writing skills are developed, so are their thinking skills," said the teacher of her students. "I am very proud of their accomplishments this year. The last couple of years have been a struggle for them because of COVID but they are resilient." Mrs. Hawes said she hopes to publish another book next year. Each of the thirteen students wrote and illustrated a page in the book. "I named the characters Anderson and Katherine," said Jade Carpenter. "I was the first one to write," she continued. "I wrote the last page too." Ashton LaClair wrote, "Anderson and Katherine decide to bake acorn cookies." After some research, we realized these are a real type of cookie! During the publication celebration and book signing, Zayne Folsom said, "I created the front cover. We all had a part in making the book." Lucas Simmons and Aly Bice said it was fun to make the book. While the book was being read, there were some pretty dramatic parts. But everything turned out alright in the end. The adventures of Anderson and Katherine could one day have a sequel! Summer Coyle, Quaid Mullaney, Owen Mullikin, Aidan Scow, Portia Simmons, Braxton Smith, Genesis Steele and Gianna Tyo also contributed to the book.






