The Zonta Club of Canton 2022 Scholarship Award winners



Emma Friot received the Helen Ann Horvath Nursing Scholarship, the Club's newest offering to graduating seniors who will pursue the study of nursing. Ms. Friot states that she has been "passionate" about being a nurse her whole life, a natural feeling because she comes from a family of nurses. Each one has inspired her to pursue the same

profession. She writes that a nurse is "a person of many talents" and uses words to describe what a nurse is – an advocate, empathetic, team oriented, and exhibiting good self-care, among others. Ms. Friot will begin her studies at Siena College. She is a graduate of Hermon DeKalb Central School.



Sophia Brown received the Members' Memorial Scholarship, established in memory of former Zonta Club of Canton members and given to a senior who demonstrated strong leadership skills and dedication to service in school and in the

community throughout her high school career. She reported completing 1676 service hours in a wide variety of meaningful activities. Ms. Brown will attend Nazareth College to study math education and special education. She says that her most effective leadership skill is empathy. Facing forms of harassment in high school herself taught her to be empathetic and understanding of others' difficulties. She is a graduate of Massena Central School.

Angelie Bush is the winner of the Club's Jean M. Coon Humanitarian Award, given to a senior who demonstrated significant community service through projects that enhanced her community and its target audience. Her primary project is called "Sting with Kindness" (the school mascot is the yellow jacket.)



It's a new program Ms. Bush created for elementary students who report incidents of kindness; the recipients are recognized by the principal with a special pin and a certificate of kindness. Ms. Bush will attend Nazareth College to study Occupational Therapy so that she can continue to help people in the future. She is a graduate of Madrid Waddington Central School.



Abigail Backus-Mackey is the winner of the Club's SUNY Canton Endowment Fund Scholarship. The SUNY scholarship is given in memory of Margaret (Peg) Sibley to a single parent who has returned to college after experiencing some of life's challenges. Ms. Backus-Mackey is earning her

bachelor's degree in Health and Fitness Promotion with a minor in Applied Psychology. Because she really wants to be a nurse, she plans to get a second bachelor's degree in that field as well while working full time and caring for her child.



Riley Taylor is the winner of the Club's Putnam-Pitts
Scholarship, given to a graduating senior with a distinguished academic record. Ms. Taylor will attend Colgate University to study environmental science while also exploring the fields of English and history. Recently, gun violence has been prevalent in our nation and has discriminated against no race or age group. WHEN TO DISPOSE OF AN AMERICAN FLAG

The U.S. Flag Code says, "The flag, when it is in such condition that it is no longer a fitting emblem for display, should be destroyed in a dignified way, preferably by burning." When an American flag is worn beyond repair, it should be retired in a respectful manner.

HOW TO DISPOSE OF A FLAG

Burning a Flag

The first way to dispose of an American flag is to hold a flag burning ceremony at your home or other private location. Before conducting a flag burning ceremony, note the material of your flag and the local fire ordinances. Some materials may emit toxins if openly burned. Begin a flag burning ceremony by folding the whole flag in its customary manner. Instructions for properly folding a flag can be found here. Next, start a fire large enough to completely burn the flag and respectfully place the flag into the fire. The flag should not touch the ground in the process.

As the flag begins to burn, salute the flag, say the Pledge of Allegiance and pause for a moment of silence. The flag should be thoroughly burned so that nothing besides ashes are left. Finally, bury the ashes.

Community Disposal Box

A second way to dispose of an American flag is to drop it off in a flag disposal box. In many communities, local government offices and police stations have flag disposal boxes. Throughout the year, organizations like the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Girl Scouts and Boy Scouts collect the disposed flags and hold ceremonies to retire them. Flag Day (June 14) is one of the most common days to hold flag disposal ceremonies. The Stars for our Troops program also accepts worn-out American flags. A volunteer for the program will cut out and send the flag's embroidered stars to an American soldier.

Burying a Flag

Although the U.S. Code says that burning is the preferred method to dispose of a flag, people also do so flag via burial. If you choose this method, place a folded flag in a dignified wooden box. Pause for a moment of silence after burying the flag box in the ground.

Recycling a Flag

A final option for disposing of a flag is to recycle it. Some flag companies will accept old flags and use the material to make new ones.

WHO CAN DISPOSE OF A FLAG?

Anyone can hold a flag disposal ceremony. Whoever chooses to retire a flag should only proceed in a way that is respectful and dignified.
